- Compare and contrast the resolutions you say have been just and those that you say did not achieve justice.
 - What do the resolutions in each group have in common with each other?

- What accounts for the differences between the just and unjust resolutions?

- WWII occurred more than 70 years ago. If justice was not served in 1945 and still has not been achieved today, can a just resolution still be achieved? Explain why or not why.

- There were not resolutions to all events, atrocities, and battles during WWII. Is there an event missing from the list above that needed a resolution?
 - If so- which event and what resolution do you propose?
 - If not- name another event in which there has been a resolution or in which a resolution is not needed. Explain!

- What can the resolutions at the end of WWII teach the present and future generations (about future wars, conflicts, justice to victims, punishments)? Name TWO things.
